A conflicted (divided) church

Tappeal to you, dear brothers and sisters, by the authority of our Lord Jesus Christ, to live in **harmony** with each other. Let there be no **divisions** in the church. Rather, be of **one mind**, **united** in thought and purpose. Vs 10

Artificial Maturity, Tim Elmore

Today, because information is so prevalent, our kids assume they have [experiential knowledge] when they only have [informational knowledge]. With an abundance of knowledge, their confidence can soar, but it's based on a virtual foundation. Without experience, it's easier for knowledge to produce judgmental attitudes, bullying, and arrogance.

Analysts say there are increasing signs that a lack of independence fuels stress, anxiety, and depression among young people. ...Kids' early lives today are too full of information and structure, and too empty of innocence and the freedom to play and explore. But by adolescence, it's almost the opposite. It's as though they experience a flip-flop. Their lives are too full of freedom, and too empty of accountability.

Artificial Maturity, Tim Elmore

For the most part, adults have failed to build true 'life skills' in kids. We haven't helped them self-regulate and make decisions about concerns that matter. Students' busy schedules often aren't all that meaningful, and young people spiral downward into despair over relatively trivial issues. Their days are full of artificial activities with artificial consequences, resulting in artificial maturity. The stress is real, but it is often over things that don't really matter, and it isn't building mature people.

As adults, we have done a poor job in getting this generation of kids ready for **life**. If they flounder, it is because we've focused on **preparing** the path for the children instead of the children for the path

Artificial Maturity, Tim Elmore

Artificial maturity is the result of two simultaneous realities in the 21st century. It can be summarized that kids are **over-exposed to information** earlier than they are ready & kids are **under-exposed to first-hand experiences** later than they are ready.

Ancient cultures had language for such circumstances. Two ancient Greek words for knowledge were ginosko and epinigosko. The first meant "to be informed or to be aware." The second meant "to fully understand through experience." It's the difference between knowing about someone and knowing someone. We've unwittingly created a society where information is so prevalent that kids can become satisfied with ginosko and never go deeper. "A wealth of information creates a poverty of attention," said Herbert Simon.



Likewise, in the church today we have people who have lots of information (some of it bad or even wrong) but very little experience. This leads to Christians becoming insecure in their faith and responding immaturely to culture

Are you wise?

"Over most of the one thousand years of philosophy in ancient Greece and Rome, philosophy was assiduously studied in every generation by many ancient philosophers and their students as the best way to become **good people** and to live **good human lives**." John M. Cooper, Pursuits of Wisdom: Six Ways of Life in Ancient Philosophy from Socrates to Plotinus

As we are looking at this passage from First Corinthians together, we are learning why it is that all our **accumulation of knowledge** does **not** ever seem to help us **handle life better**. The reason, however, is not so much because of the **lack of knowledge** -- we all have lots of knowledge today -- but because of the **lack of wisdom**, true wisdom, and this is why this passage is so fantastically helpful to us. You can't get enough knowledge to make you wise

You don't get wisdom from imitation

Wisdom is not found in comfort

Failure is usually the first step towards wisdom

When I first came to you, dear brothers and sisters, I didn't use lofty words and impressive wisdom to tell you God's secret plan. 2:1

σοφιρία: the wisdom which belongs to men, skill, knowledge and practice

Wisdom is not simply in the mind, it is also the methods of culture. Paul continually contrasts this with God's way as if the two are mutually exclusive

I came to you in weakness—timid and trembling. And my message and my preaching were very plain. Rather than using clever and persuasive speeches, I relied only on the power of the Holy Spirit. I did this so you would trust not in human wisdom but in the power of God. Vs 3-5

Yet when I am among mature believers, I do speak with words of wisdom, but not the kind of wisdom that belongs to this world or to the rulers of this world, who are soon forgotten. Vs 6

No, the wisdom we speak of is the mystery of God—his plan that was previously hidden, even though he made it for our ultimate glory before the world began. Vs 7

But it was to us that God revealed these things by his **Spirit**. For his **Spirit** searches out everything and shows us God's **deep secrets**. No one can know a person's thoughts except that person's own spirit, and no one can know God's thoughts except God's own **Spirit**. Vs 10-11

When we tell you these things, we do not use words that come from human wisdom. Instead, we speak words given to us by the Spirit, using the Spirit's words to explain spiritual truths. Vs 13

But people who aren't spiritual can't receive these truths from God's Spirit. It all sounds foolish to them and they can't understand it, for only those who are spiritual can understand what the Spirit means. The person with the Spirit makes judgments about all things, but such a person is not subject to merely human judgments, Vs 14-15

αςνακριανω, Anakrino, judge: to investigate, examine, enquire into, scrutinize, sift, question, determine the excellence or defects of any person or thing

What do the **smart, powerful people** of the world do with Jesus of Nazareth? Well, the answer is they **crucify** him, don't they? They **reject** him; they **deny** him; they put him to **death** if they possibly can. That is what they did in the 1st century and that is what they still do **today**. Why? Because they think he is crazy? No, even today, 2,000 years later, nobody thinks Jesus was crazy.

Well, why do they resist him? The answer, of course, is not because they think he is crazy, but because they are afraid he is right. He threatens people. Ray Stedman

Are you wise?


For I decided that while I was with you I would **forget everything** except Jesus Christ, the one who was crucified. Vs 2

How does Paul confront the most **corrupt city (culture)** in the Roman Empire? He doesn't, he leans into the Holy Spirit. He **"forgets everything"** except Christ.

The distinction is important, learn culture, methodology and values, or learn Jesus.



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
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
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
