Many Christians find the ideas and language of relational theology helpful. But many also appreciate relational theology without really being clear about what it is. Misunderstandings emerge. As they read the Bible, Christians frequently encounter relational theology's ideas and language. Unfortunately, however, conventional Christian theologies have sometimes ignored relational ideas and language. The conventional theology that results is sometimes impractical and nonsensical.

What is Relational Theology?, Thomas Jay Oord

At its core, relational theology affirms **two** key ideas:

God affects creatures in various ways. Instead of being aloof and detached, God is active and involved in relationship with others. God relates to us, and that makes an essential difference.

Creatures affect God in various ways. While God's nature is unchanging, creatures influence the loving and living Creator of the universe. We relate to God, and creation makes a difference to God.

Because God loves before He creates the physical world, love precedes matter. We need to be careful with this truth because matter really matters. In fact, the Western church's underappreciation of the physical realm has created all sorts of problems. Yet while the material world is deeply important to God, there is a sense in which loving relationships are even more ultimate, more foundational, and more solid to the working of the cosmos than the sidewalk under our feet. **God's love is more trustworthy than the very ground we walk on**. 
The "anti-christian" exists **outside** of relationship with God. It's the only way they can **justify** their behaviour

the impact of the father's death was more profound than it is today. Both of these points are stressed by J.-U. Krause in his massive *Habilitationsschrift* on widows and orphans in the Roman world. Krause estimates that during the time of the Roman Empire some 40-45 per cent of children aged 14-15 had lost their father. J.T. Fitzgerald

Identity

Orphans constituted a long-standing problem in the ancient Mediterranean world, and early Christians were not unique in seeking to address it. They made a variety of responses both as individuals and as an institution. Of the responses by **individuals**, adoption was surely the most significant one, and it was encouraged by church leaders... The creation of an orphanage, on the other hand, was an **institutional** response, and as such, it was an utterly unique, truly *sui generis* institution in the ancient world. And it was to have a long history, extending even to today. J.T. Fitzgerald

It wasn't simply that Christians opposed abortion.
Abortion was dangerous and relatively rare. A more common practice was called "infant exposure."

Features That Made the Early Church Unique

Identity

Some things grow **commonplace** over time. We've heard about them and known them for years. Maybe at first, when it was new, an idea or experience affected us. The lack of family leaves someone vulnerable.

John stands in awe of God's **gesture** of love that invites us to live a life of **familial** relationship. And the early church responds by extending this new 'spiritual relationship' to **all**

Promise

Second and third generation disciples may **question** this relationship.

Hope

Note that believers don't live holy lives to prove they are children of God, but they live holy lives because they **are** children of God. To **invert** the divine pattern is to open one's self to the subtle trap of legalism and self-righteousness.

Hope


So you have not received a spirit that makes you fearful slaves. Instead, you received God's Spirit when he adopted you as his own children. Now we call him, "Abba, Father."
